

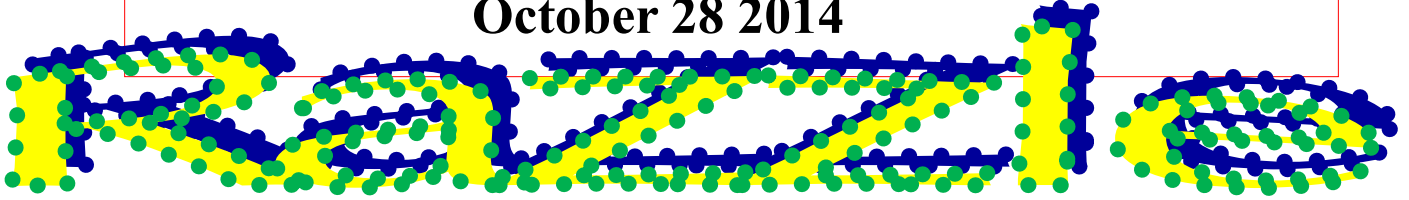

Free Energy information session - FAQs

Who is the Consumer Utilities Advocacy Centre and what is EnergyInfoHub?

The Consumer Utilities Advocacy Centre (CUAC) is an independent, not-for-profit organisation advocating for affordable, accessible and fair energy and water utilities. CUAC is hitting the road with its EnergyInfoHub project (<http://energyinfohub.org.au/>) to give free, independent and expert information on all things energy.

What is the information session about?

The EnergyInfoHub gives people the control and confidence they need to manage their energy bill. We show people *3 Easy Ways to Save*:

- Shopping around to get a better electricity better deal - around 1 in 2 Victorians can save \$340 a year by using the Victorian Government's My Power Planner website
- Getting concessions - anyone with a concession card can save around \$350 on energy by getting the main two concessions
- Saving energy – let's face it, there are more exciting things to spend money on! Simple tips to put money back in people's pockets

Of course, there's a lot more to energy so we can discuss other things – just let us know what takes your fancy:

- Understanding those confusing energy bills
- What to do with payment difficulties, facing disconnection, or solving problems
- Door Knocking, your rights
- Who are distributors and retailers?
- What is a kilo-Watt?
- New electricity pricing - flexible pricing
- Your smart meter

The interactive sessions are free, informative and take around 1.5 hours. Tuesday 11 November 1.30 to 3.00pm at the Neighbourhood House
